

BLM seeking public comment on proposed Jackson Mountains wild horse gather

WINNEMUCCA — The Bureau of Land Management (BLM), Winnemucca District, Black Rock Field Office is soliciting public comment on the Jackson Mountains Herd Management Area (HMA) Wild Horse Gather Plan Preliminary Environmental Assessment (EA). The Proposed Action calls for a phased-in approach to reach the appropriate management level over a six to 10 year period. This will be accomplished by conducting an initial wild horse removal in July 2012, and implementing fertility control, adjusting sex ratios and managing a non-breeding population of geldings in subsequent gathers. Substantive comments on this proposal should be submitted by 4:30 p.m., May 1, 2012.

The proposed gather is needed to remove excess wild horses to help prevent further deterioration of range conditions, reduce population growth rates, achieve and maintain a thriving natural ecological balance and maintain healthy wild horse populations. High wild horse numbers combined with low precipitation have resulted in poor forage and water conditions in the HMA. If the situation continues to escalate, wild horses may need to be gathered earlier than proposed. Helicopter drive trap and/or bait trapping may be considered.
